



How to Home Compost Our Sugarcane Products

Turn your takeaway packaging into garden gold

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CUT OR SHRED

your sugarcane packaging into smaller pieces.



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Add to your compost bin
with kitchen scraps and garden waste.



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Balance your mix:

Sugarcane is a “Brown” (carbon-rich), so aim for 70% browns and 30% greens (nitrogen-rich).

Keep it moist and airy:

Like a wrung-out sponge. Turn occasionally.

Wait and harvest:

Compost is ready in 4–6 months.
Use it in your garden beds or pots.



Greens:

veggie scraps, coffee grounds, grass clippings

Browns:

sugarcane packaging, dry leaves, cardboard, paper towels

Compost Tips

1.

Good compost smells earthy, not stinky.

2.

If it smells bad, add more browns and turn the pile.

3.

Avoid adding meat, dairy, oils, or pet waste.

Why It Matters

1. Sugarcane packaging is plant-based and compostable at home (Where noted as certified).
2. Diverts waste from landfill and enriches your soil.
3. Supports circular sustainability.
